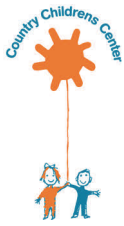

We have had quite a start to the school year. In September, Bedford Hills began a transformation to a multi-age program. Although it's been many years since we have employed this program, it is thriving. This is a direct testament to our staff and families.

In November, we had a group of babies, similar in age, ready to move up to the toddler room. While it's a bit atypical to have so many move at the same time, it provided a wonderful opportunity to keep them together. With these new additions, we now have two toddler rooms.

Toddler 1 is a younger group. Teresa and Maggy are leading the way as teachers. Teresa has been with the Country Childrens Center for fifteen years. Along with her experience she brings a Child Development Associate accreditation. Maggy joined us in August, and has immediately become an asset to the center. In her home country of Chile, she has run her own classroom, and obtained a four-year teaching assistant degree. Together, Maggy and Teresa have embraced this new room, implementing games, adding circle time traditions, and creating a home feel environment for the children.

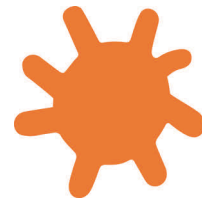
Toddler 2 has a slightly older group who we describe as the veterans. The children have gone from a two room setting to one, but have responded well to change, and continue to grow by leaps and bounds. They will soon be on their way up to pre-school. Diana Monge is the teacher at the helm of the ship, and they are all riding the waves of change beautifully. Diana came to the Country Childrens Center in 2006. She also brings with her the Child Associate Development credential. Her daughter, nearly four years old, is also part of the CCC family. Diana takes ideas and an insight from watching her daughter grow, and combines that with her education to shape her programs.

I am thrilled how well this transition has gone, and the improvements to Bedford Hills are clear. The parents of our children deserve thanks and appreciation for their understanding and flexibility. Fall Awakenings



Autumn at Kitchawan Barns is always a special time of year. As summer comes to an end, the gentle fall breeze awakens our senses to the beginning of a new school year. Mother Nature beckons the children to explore, discover and experience the many changes that occurs as summer ends, fall arrives and winter soon follows.

Nature teaches us that all things are interconnected and that the end of one journey marks the beginning of a new adventure - learning is circular. The children at Kitchawan Barns observe the spectrum of color that appears as the leaves change colors, they harvest the last of the veggies from the garden, they watch the squirrels move about gathering acorns for the winter months ahead, and the monarch butterflies flutter about the playground as if they are saying "see you in the spring!"

The change of season provides multiple sources of inspiration for teachers and students to explore in the classroom. The Pre-K classroom observed the change of season and made art-work that depicted the beginning, middle and end of fall. The infants journeyed on nature walks with their teachers to explore the fall season and learn new words. The toddlers explored the fall season with their senses - raking leaves into piles for jumping and collecting leaves on nature walks. The preschool classroom investigated the beautiful changes of fall learning about the harvest season with a visit to an apple orchard and creating their own apple farm in their dramatic play area.

We learn at Kitchawan Barns that nature truly is the great provider and teacher. As the holiday season is upon us, we are thankful that our classrooms are inspired by the beauty and grandeur of Mother Nature. The end is always the beginning!

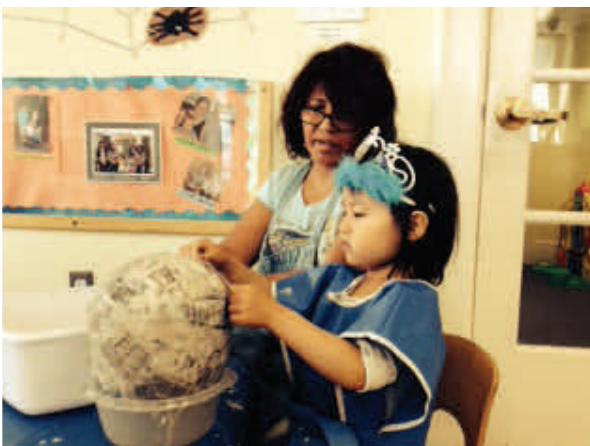


Creative With Our Curriculum

Enthusiasm is what you feel as you enter the classrooms at Watson. The teachers are busy developing curriculum that's engaging, creative and fun. Meanwhile, the children are learning about the world through these exciting activities by going on nature walks, playing games, reading stories and cooking!

The Pre-school and Pre-K curriculum has taken on a new tone this year. With the pressures of some of the education standards, we found that we had to adjust our ways. Having given it a lot of thought, we made time for both small group work and creative play.

During our small group time, the program Handwriting Without Tears is being implemented for reading and math. This program uses hands-on, multisensory materials to teach prewriting skills, phonological awareness and basic math concepts. During reading and writing, the children learn to identify and write letters, both capital and lowercase. They learn how these letters work together to form printed words, and how printed words relate to spoken language. With playful manipulatives, music, and rhymes, the numbers and math program teaches counting comparisons, spatial awareness, patterning, sequencing, matching, sorting, problem solving, and even Pre-K geometry skills. They also get time to play with real objects and test their ideas so that math becomes real and meaningful. It's exciting to see children take risks and tackling concepts with confidence and continue to have fun while learning!

Of course, during our day there is always time made for creative expression and fun. One very exciting activity during this time has been cooking. All the children have had the opportunity to be little chefs while learning about measuring, kitchen safety, and practicing fine motors skills by mixing and dicing. Some of the delicious recipes include Pilgrim's pudding and pumpkin ice cream!

A special thanks to the teachers for working hard and making learning fun and exciting! Thank you to all the families for all their support!

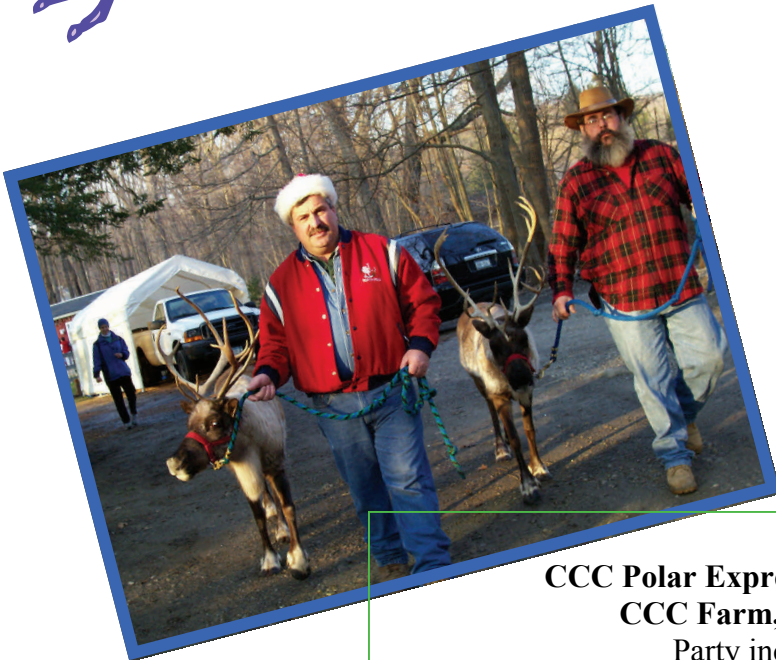
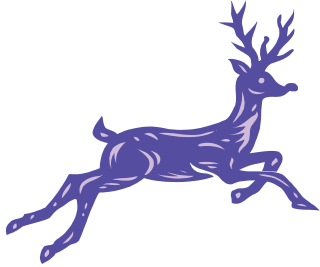
