#### Summer in the Garden

Anyone who drives into our parking lot can't help but comment on the beautiful towering sunflowers in our garden. Before Ms. Kristen left on summer break, she set to work with the Preschool and Pre-K classes to prepare the ground. She and the children did some weeding and then the CCC Garden Crew came in to till the soil and make it ready to receive the packets of Country Childrens Center Sunflower Seeds. We love that they are doing so well.

This is in no small way due to the efforts of Ms. Monika who, on a weekly basis, gardened with some of the Toddlers and the Preschool and Pre-K children. Taking two children at a time, Monika was able to talk about what the children were seeing and guided them on how to treat the garden. The garden is another perfect place in nature for children to explore by touch, feel, smell, and eventually taste. Sensory exploration is crucial to children's learning! In fact, the children have a garden bed set aside for DIGGING ONLY. The children learn that it is ok to dig in the box that does not have any plants or flowers growing in it and that it is not ok to dig where the plants are growing. In essence, Monika models appropriate garden behavior. Together the children and Monika observe. share information, (it takes soil, water, and sunshine to make plants grow), share experiences, ask questions, and, in general feel, comfortable in the environment, (it's common to see bugs, spiders, and worms.) The children are also learning that a garden has to be taken care of so it can produce food. They are learning that it takes time for things to grow; they are learning patience. Many of the children are enjoying the colors of the plants and their flowers. It's been a really good summer for gardening and we are grateful to be able to provide the children with this hands-on experience.

### Mixing it up at Bedford Hills—Multi-Age Preschool

After a summer of joint efforts among the Toddler, Preschooler and Pre-K classes to create our new "GREEN" recycled garden space, (thanks to the generous help of Daniel Mond -CCC parent), we are embracing another new and exciting journey at Bedford Hills CCC. Beginning this September, 2014, we will be combining our preschool and PreK classes, to create three multiage classrooms.

After much research, various meetings, and contemplation on how it would work at our center, we are very excited to embark on a new journey. Traditionally, CCC has had our classrooms separated by age. However, we have come to realize that not all three year olds learn at the same rate or are interested in the same things. The same goes with all four and five year olds. Quoting from an article written about implementing a multiage preschool, "A mixed age preschool classroom is a rich learning environment that offers time and support for their young learners, respecting differences in their learning styles and paces." In a recent parent and staff meeting here, Polly Peace, CCC's Executive Director asked everyone to close their eyes (and I ask that you do the same for a moment) and picture your childhood neighborhood...Who were your friends? Were they all the same age? Didn't the older children lead and help the younger children? Didn't the younger children learn from the older ones and step up to greater challenges in games? Relationships were more like a family, which is the goal that CCC has always strived for.

We have incorporated, as part of the day, a separate Kindergarten Readiness group, to ensure that the children moving on to Kindergarten will be well-prepared. We are well aware that our youngest preschoolers will need a different pace and we are prepared to help them. In addition, Bedford Hills is getting a piano to be able to offer musical enrichment and piano lessons; as well as a great new loft space to encourage dramatic play, social skills and a quiet space for all of the children. We know we will have challenges to face, but are very positive about all of the successes we will get to celebrate within the diversity of this new model. We are so excited about all of these upcoming changes, and know that it will make Bedford Hills CCC even more unique and special than it already has proven to be.
