In the spirit of acts of kindness and focusing on GIVING around the giving season (Thanksgiving and the winter holidays), we wanted to do just that with the kids at CCC Bedford Hills. We wanted to focus more on the spirit of giving, and how it feels to give, as opposed to only receiving. We decided to choose a charity related to children, and wanted our CCC kids to be active participants in giving to such a charity. We chose the Save the Children organization because they help children in need and it just so happens that the President of the CCC Board works for Save the Children.

We started our giving project by reading the book "The Giving Tree," by Shel Silverstein. We followed the book up with a discussion about how it feels to get and how sometimes it feels even better to give. We spoke to the children about how much we have to be thankful for and that some families and children are not as fortunate. Additionally, we put out an exciting light up rocket ship (piggy) bank in which the children could collect and deposit coins. We wanted it to be something that they could literally SEE as the amount of change climbed up the tube....to see that just a little change can make "change" for another child. The kids really got into the spirit of giving. We collected, not only the coins, but asked the kids and Bedford Hills' families to donate their gently used or new toys, dolls, and books from home. The parents and children of Bedford Hills were extremely generous in their donations and we are proud to announce that we collected \$89.85 in coins in the rocket ship (and will be adding the extra change to make it an even \$100), and are sending about 5-6 boxes filled with some used and many new toys, books, and clothing through Save the Children to a Head Start program in great need in Louisiana. The children in the Preschool and PreK classes are working on a letter to send along with the donations, and are packing up the boxes themselves, which we hope will impress upon them even further, the connection and great feeling one can get from giving to others.

Thank you to all of the Bedford Hills families for your help, donations, and enthusiasm in our giving project. Your generosity is greatly appreciated by us and will undoubtedly reach down through the hearts of your children all the way to Louisiana to truly touch the lives of others.

Winter at Kitchawan

It has been a very busy Winter here at Kitchawan Barns. Along with this Winter being busy it has been very long. All the classes have done a great job keeping the children occupied through the long cold Winter days.

In the Baby Barn they enjoyed all the sensory aspects of indoor snow play in their sensory bin. When the weather permitted the babies went for quick, cool word walks where the teachers described their surroundings and introduced new words to the children. Another favorite Winter activity the babies enjoyed many times this Winter was watching the snow fall through their large low windows. There were also many Winter and snow themed books, songs and art projects to keep them busy and learning.

Just like the babies the toddlers enjoyed indoor snow play in their sensory bin. To make the snow play a little more interesting the toddler teachers added liquid water color to the snow. The children enjoyed watching the colors swirl and mix in the snow as they played. They also got a lesson on color mixing. For art projects the children worked on creating their own winter wardrobes making hats, boots, mittens and scarves. Another fun sensory activity the toddlers did was playing with melted snow (which is a combination of corn starch and water) It is a very soothing sensory activity that the children really enjoyed. Lots of Winter songs and finger plays also!

The preschool was able to get outside and build some great snow forts and castles. They used a milk crate to make blocks out of snow and used the snow blocks to build with. They enjoyed learning and talking about icicles. They measured their length, timed how long it takes them to melt and measured the amount of water they melted in to. The preschool used all their five senses with indoor snow play. They were given cooking tools in the snow to pretend to cook with it.

The pre-k class started the Winter out with a big unit on the Arctic. They learned about the animals that live there, what they ate and where they lived in the arctic. Like all the other classes they played with snow indoors at the sensory table. They talked about their five senses and how they used them playing with the snow. For art projects they made Eskimos with their own faces and igloos with yummy marshmallows.

Even though Kitchawan has done many fun and educational things during the Winter months we are all looking forward to Spring and the fun we will have then!
