Bedford Hills: Group Cohesiveness

The biggest differences between the morning program and the afternoon are the size and structure. The morning program has a more personal atmosphere to it. The children arrive at staggering times. Since there is a smaller amount of children, there is more one-on-one time which includes playing and even eating breakfast. In the afternoon the children all arrive at once and the group is a lot larger. As a result, we design many group activities.

Since the children in the morning come in at staggering times and most eat breakfast, it is difficult to have an organized group activity. However, we do try and get a group game going once everyone is done. Some of the games they like to play are sorry, clue, life, and trivial pursuit. Their favorite is when we bring some of the sports equipment out which, of course, are safe and appropriate to play with in the

cafeteria. In fact we just ordered some new stuff to play with. In the afternoon someone gets to choose the group activities which have included: capture the flag, kick ball, soccer, quick sand, tunnel tag, misquote tag, Indian chief, and wizard. The game they like playing the most is wizard During free time the kids love playing with the blocks and marbles.

Both programs have their unique aspects. I enjoy having the up close and personal family-like atmosphere in the morning. But at the same time the afternoon allows a more flexible schedule and planning of art activities. West Patent: Building a Program

West Patent Elementary School is the newest edition to the wonderful C.C.C. after school programs. The program started back in January of last year. The program consisted of only 4 children and has since doubled in size. Building up the West Patent program has proposed some challenges but I am confident that it will continue to flourish.

For the past few years I have worked for C.C.C. as a counselor at our Summer Adventure Camp. During camp I work with the Sequoias, our largest group which consists of about 20 children all going into 5th or 6th grade. Coming to our West Patent program and working with such a small number children who vary in ages from Kindergarten all the way up to the 5th grade has presented its challenges. The biggest challenge that I face is trying to plan activities that will get all of the children of different ages interacting with one another. To help overcome this obstacle I try to have all of the children engage in at least one group activity per day whether it is a board game inside or a game of tag out on the playground to help them develop a sense of unity.

Our schedule is pretty consistent from day to day. We start our afternoons off by meeting on the rug to discuss how each of their days were. We then move onto homework/quiet time where the children get a chance to get their school work out of the way or to just hang out and relax quietly after a long day at school. Once everyone's homework is complete we will have a snack. The kids have really been enjoying the fresh vegetables and blueberry muffins. When snack is finished the kids clean up and we'll head to either the gym or outside to the playground for a group activity and some free play.

The children at West Patent have a variety of activities that they enjoy participating in. While playing inside they love to play the board game Life where they get to pretend to have their dream career such as an athlete or a teacher. They also seem to enjoy trying to beat me at Guess Who. The kids have also had fun drawing pictures to decorate our shelves and have gotten really creative. While playing in the gym or outside they enjoying playing a variety of sporting games such as kickball, basketball and their new found love for

football.

As the Director I have set some personal goals for the year. I hope to create an environment where all of your children feel they are part of something great, a place where they feel welcomed, safe and comfortable. I want them to be excited to come to C.C.C. each day. I would love to see all of the different age groups bond and form new friendships. I would like to see our older children become positive role models who our younger children can look up to. I am looking forward to the rest of the year. and to continuing to build up the West Patent program.

Katonah: Theater and Improvisation

At the afterschool program at Katonah Elementary School we have twenty four children who range from six to ten years old. This school year, every Thursday is "Theater Thursday", where we take time, usually twenty to thirty minutes, to play some sort of theater, improvisation, or ice breaker game. These include games such as, ZOO, Indian Chief, Guess the Person, Human Knot, Taxi Driver, Bus Stop, Dinner Party, and Freeze and Justify.

When the kids heard that they were going to be doing this, they didn't seem very enthusiastic about it. However, during the games and after completing the games, they all for the most part say that they really enjoy participating and this can be seen just by their body language and attitudes.

The main goals of these games and exercises are to get each child to

develop their own voice and feel more comfortable speaking and performing in front of a group of people. They also teach children to be mindful of each other as they share the spotlight. It isn't easy being put on the spot. It can be nerve racking, but learning these exercises early on, will help them down the road on projects and presentations, as well as being able to think critically, be creative, and improvise with what they are given.

These exercises can be a great outlet for frustration and help children build active imaginations. I really enjoy watching the children actively participate during these cooperative games.
